The stop-question-and-frisk program, or stop-and-frisk, in New York City, is a New York City Police Department practice of temporarily detaining, questioning, and at times searching civilians on the street for weapons and other contraband. The New York City Police Department, an NCCRS member since 1974, serves the citizens of the five boroughs of the city. It is the nation's largest police agency, employing approximately 35,000 uniformed members and 18,000 civilian members. Violent crime in New York City has been dropping since 1991 and, as of 2017, is among the lowest of major cities in the United States. In 2017, there were 290 homicides, the lowest number since the 1940s. According to a 2015 ranking of 50 cities by The Economist, New York was the 10th-overall-safest major city in the world, as well as the 28th-safest in personal safety.
